

What's Happening in WHSD?



Production is ramping up on Woodland Hills' spring musical, and this year's show comes with a twist. "Wonderland" will hit the stage April 25-27 and May 2-4 in the Thomas G. Crone Auditorium. The box office opens March 7 in the main lobby of the high school, as well as at whhs.ludus.com.

"Wonderland" is a pilot production, as Woodland Hills is one of two schools in the entire country that will be performing the show for the first time at the high school level. "Wonderland" is a reimagining of the classic "Alice in Wonderland," and it has been changed considerably since it first debuted on Broadway. The show is being presented through special arrangement with Music Theatre International. "Wonderland" follows up on the junior musical production of "Annie," which wowed audiences in early January. The show, which included students from Dickson Preparatory STEAM Academy and underclassmen at the high school, featured Evabelle Rinsema and Adore McFadden in the titular role of the 11-year-old orphan, Richard Master as Oliver Warbucks, Noelle Brubaker as Grace Farrell, and Olivia Safran and Jae Saunders shared the roles of Miss Hannigan and Sophie. Luke DeVore played Rooster Hannigan, Delaney Cass and Cameron Peretti played the role of Lily St. Regis, while Ruslan Connelly and Elijah Pittler performed as President Franklin Delano Roosevelt and dogcatchers. Annie's fellow orphans included Thea Wilk as Molly, Jordin Burgh as Pepper, Elizabeth Ansell as Duffy, Peyton Sarafis as July, Amiyah Holeman as Tessie, Caroline Elston as Kate, Elizabeth Ketcham as a featured orphan, and Kymaura Edmondson as a featured orphan and Cecille.



Thanks to support from Project SEEKS SES – a grant partnership between the Allegheny Intermediate Unit and Allegheny County Department of Health – the Woodland Hills School District installed a Calming Room at Turtle Creek Elementary STEAM Academy. The room follows the concept of the Resiliency Room at Woodland Hills High School. Equipped with dim lighting, beanbag chairs and a variety of activities to help a student calm down, the district is thrilled to provide its youngest learners a safe, calming space in times of need. "The students can come to that room and take a break from the everyday stressors that they're dealing with," said Pamela White, the district's Director of Administrative Services and WHOA Coordinator. "A lot of our students deal with trauma, and we want to give them a safe space to take as much time as they need." A Calming Room is also being installed at Edgewood Elementary STEAM Academy.



Woodland Hills has launched a new robotics club at the newly opened Rankin Community Center specifically geared toward young girls. The Mother-Daughter VEX Robotics Club meets twice a month and allows for

fourth and fifth grade girls in the district to work with their mothers as they work with VEX Robotics kits and learn more about STEM education. Approximately 20 students and their mothers are participating in the club, and they spend the bulk of the meeting time with their hands on one of the VEX kits. They follow instructions to build a robotic vehicle, then put the vehicle through a series of tests, including an obstacle course, using a coding a program on a tablet.

STEM education principles encourage improved communication, encourages creative thinking and development of unique ideas, and enhances students' ability to solve problems and troubleshoot issues. The mother-daughter club will continue into to meet into the spring. Woodland Hills is also developing

other STEM opportunities for students through the VEX Robotics curriculum, including a middle school club that meets weekly and a competitive robotics team.
