Red Lantern Bike Shop Opens in Turtle Creek

Do you remember growing up in our town when we could walk mostly anywhere we wanted or needed to go? Yes, it was a long walk, especially in the high heat of summer or the freezing cold of winter. But remember if you had a bicycle how quickly you could get to your destination? My brother and I got our hand-me-down bikes from our cousins. What a great day that was!

In Turtle Creek, we now have bicycles at the Calvary Church Opportunity Shop at 125 Shaw Avenue. Red Lantern Bike Shop, owned by Brian and Maria T. Cruz Sink, started in 2013 in Braddock and did mostly bike giveaways and some repairs. In 2020 the nonprofit shop expanded from Braddock into the Opportunity Shop and started to refurbish adult bikes.

The name of the shop derives from the Tour de France bicycle race. The rider who comes in last place is awarded the Red Lantern for continuing and not quitting. The shop's mission statement is their belief that everyone deserves to have access to bicycles not only for fun, but for exercise and/or transportation, regardless of their financial situation. They accept children's bikes in any working condition and then redistribute them to surrounding communities. They also have a giveaway program for children and provide low-cost repair services.

Owner Brian Sink's involvement began when he volunteered with Free Ride Pittsburgh- a bike repair facility. He partnered with John Fetterman in Braddock and repaired bikes in conjunction with the Free Store. Currently, they have dispersed over 6,000 bikes in Allegheny County







They are looking for volunteers to help in any way you can. It certainly is a great give-back program for our community to be involved in and it would be so appreciated.

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Happy New Year to all! I am looking forward to my final year as Turtle Creek Mayor and hope to build on what we have accomplished over the past 7 years. While we have had so many positive things occur in our community, we also continue to struggle with some very serious issues, including domestic and gun violence that the COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated in many of our communities. It has left people isolated and many in-person services may not be available at this time.

For every fatal shooting there are three other nonfatal gun incidents, resulting in physical, psychological, and societal harm. Many of these incidents are domestic (meaning they involved family or close friends who may live together or have another close personal connection in the same household) in nature causing trauma to those living in that environment, including children and teens. Recent statistics in our area are showing incidents increasing due to the COVID-19 pandemic.


We as community members and local government officials need to explore ways to reduce this violence and treat it as the public health crisis that it is. Current research demonstrates that it is possible to prevent gun and domestic violence in the long term, but most of our communities lack the resources or expertise to do what is needed to deal with these complex issues.

With the input from young people, community members, the faith community, nonprofits, service providers, and others, we can start to understand and develop a set of recommendations to address gun and domestic violence in our communities. The key is working together as concerned citizens to provide support and resources for those struggling.

I know we have some very dedicated residents who are already doing this work and sharing support services available to those struggling. We are still in a pandemic so most in-person services and/or groups are not able to provide the same level of care as usual. If you have expertise on how to address these issues in our COVID environment, please reach out. It would be great to bring these recommendations and programs to our residents so we can be proactive and see less violence and trauma in our area.
